## Malaysia, Japan to deepen partnership in energy transition, sustainability

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysia is looking to strengthen strategic coop-eration with Japan, particularly in energy transition and sustain-ability, said Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim.

He said his meeting with for-mer Japanese prime minister Fu-mio Kishida yesterday marked a significant step in enhancing bi-lateral cooperation to address global challenges, especially in advancing clean energy and en-vironmental sustainability. He said as Asean chair, Malaysia was committed to lead-ing regional efforts towards a low-carbon future. "We welcome Japan's technical

support and advanced research, support and advanced research, including through initiatives such as the Asia Zero Emission Community, particularly to fast-track the implementation of Malaysia's National Energy Tran-sition Roadmap on a large scale," he said on Facebook. Anwar, who is finance minister,

said Japan's expertise in renewable energy, bioenergy and car-bon capture, utilisation and stor-age technologies positioned it as a valuable partner in Malaysia's efforts to become a regional hub for sustainable and innovative energy solutions. "To that end, Malaysia has pro-

posed a new centre of cooper-ation in the country to enhance cross-sector collaboration in technology, sustainability and Asean energy integration.

"With expanded linkages between industry, policy and re-search communities in both na-tions, we are confident that Malaysia can accelerate its energy transition agenda, pioneer in-novative solutions and strength-en regional economic resilience." Malaysia's ties with Japan have deepened since both nations el-evated ties to a Comprehensive Strategic Partnership in 2023. Japan remains a key economic partner, with nearly 3,000 man-

ufacturing projects involving Japanese participation imple-mented in Malaysia up to June last year. The projects represent a total investment of RMI05.2 billion, creating nearly 344,000 jobs.

According to the Statistics De-partment, Japan was Malaysia's fourth-largest foreign direct investment source in the fourth quarter of 2024, with RM102.02 billion in investments — an in-crease from RM94.18 billion in the same period in 2023.
