"SME users would be worst affected as they are not eligible for any off-peak period tariff discount under the Tariff D category, un-

like the medium and large users which are eligible under the Tariff E category. We have submitted memoranda to the authorities several times, requesting TNB to extend its off-peak rates to all the plastics manufacturing companies in the Tariff D category (lowvoltage users), and extend the offpeak electricity tariff to cover full days of Saturdays and Sundays for all categories of TNB users, but unfortunately they were all rejected," he explained.

Lim said in 2012, Malaysia exported RM10 billion of plastic products which represent 62% of the total industry sales of RM16.1 billion.

"Electricity cost is the second largest cost component for the manufacture of plastic products meant for export, after the cost of resins."
