NATIONAL utility company Tenaga Nasional Bhd (TNB) delivrend a stabilitie bid (TNB) deliv-ered a stable operational perfor-mance for the first quarter ended March 31, 2025 (Q1 2025), rein-forcing its commitment to power-ing Malaysia's energy future and advancing rakyat-centric develop-ment.

advancing rakyat-centric develop ment. The group's Q1 2025 perfor-mance reflected stable and sus-tained electricity demand, sup-ported by ongoing domestic eco-nomic growth. Consumption from the com-

Consumption from the commercial sectors grew by 5.1% largely driven by the rise of ener-gy-intensive industries such as data centres.

data centres. As Malaysia advances its ambi-tion to become a regional digital hub, TNB continues to power crit-ical infrastructure for the sector. As of first quarter 2025, the group had energised 21 data cen-tres and secured 43 supply agree-ments, with a total committed load of around 6.4GW, reinforcing its role as a key enabler of the its role as a key enabler of the nation's digital and industrial transformation.

Additionally, the appreciation of the ringgit against US dollar, from RM4.73 in March 2024 to RM4.44 RM4.73 in March 2024 to RM4.44 in March 2025 helped ease pres-sure on fuel and capital expendi-tures, with forex gains turning positive due to the stronger cur-rency. This further supported TNB's financial resilience.
